NORTH GREENVILLE at Charleston Southern

It will be a homecoming week of sorts for NGU football coach Jamey Chadwell who will take his young Crusader team to Charleston Southern, a program he spent the last five years with as an assistant coach. Chadwell will experience the in-state Baptist rivalry from the other side of the ball this year, and he hopes his Crusaders cross to the win side of the ball against his former team.

Charleston Southern won last year's game in a defensive battle that ended in a 27-0 win for the Buccaneers. The Buccaneers ground out 372 total yards and held the usually potent NGU offensive attack to a season low 120 yards. CSU leads the overall series 8-1, with NGU's sole win coming in 2003, a 49-21 victory. The series began in 1998 and has always featured high scoring games. NGU and CSU battled in a 46-33 game in 2006 in Tigerville, and the Bucs held on for victory.

North Greenville finished up its unofficial "conference" schedule against Lenoir Rhyne of the South Atlantic Conference this past Saturday. The Bears had a big first half, staking a 26-0 lead before NGU stormed back late in the game. Zach Sears nailed a 36-yard field goal with 4:37 left in the third quarter to avoid LR pitching the shutout. Then, the defense, which forced five fumbles, got rolling. After a LR touchdown, freshman **Josh Murph** (Spartanburg, SC/Boiling Springs HS) sprinted in for an 11-yard touchdown run to pull NGU to within 32-10. Freshman **Isaiah Johnson** (Fort Lawn, WI/Lewisville HS) returned a LR punt 79 yards for a touchdown to complete the scoring. Lenoir Rhyne came out on top 32-16, but the momentum the Crusaders generated late in the game hopefully will carry over to the CSU game.

Obviously, this will be a little more special weekend for us because we'll be playing against players we recruited, and Coach Staggs (Chad) coached there, Coach Isaac (Newland) played there, and Coach Durham (Matt) played there as well, so it'll be a memorable weekend," Coach Chadwell noted. "First and foremost though is this will be an exciting chance for our players to get a victory. It's a great opportunity for our guys to play a team that played the #1 team in the country (Florida) and a very good South Florida team. They'll have a better idea if they can compete at that level."

"It will be exciting to see some friends we made down in Charleston, but we're going down there to win." Chadwell also added, "we played with a little passion in the second half against Lenoir Rhyne. I expect that to carry over to this weekend and for the rest of the year."

Defensively for the Crusaders, Jamarius Robinson led the team with eight tackles and a fumble recovery. [Andre Bernardi](#), [Damien Wright](#), and [Nick Rosamonda](#) each had six tackles, and Bernardi led the defense with 1.5 tackles for loss.

After playing at CSU, NGU will head to NAIA Edward Waters on Oct. 3, and then journey to Florence, Alabama for the re-match with third ranked North Alabama on Oct. 8.

JAMEY CHADWELL BIO

New NGU Coach Jamey Chadwell spent the last five years at Charleston Southern, and began his career as the running backs coach and recruiting coordinator. He also has coached the wide receivers the last four seasons, served as passing game coordinator in 2006, and was named Assistant Head Coach in 2007. Chadwell helped guide the Buccaneers to three winning seasons in the last four years, and the team's 28 wins during that time span tied for first in the Big South Conference.



While working with the wide receivers at CSU, he coached Maurice Price, who was an All-Southeast Region performer, and was also named the Southeast's Receiver of the Year in 2005. He also coached CSU standouts Bryant Burch, who played in the Canadian Football League, and 2007 All-Big South performer Dee Brown.

A former standout quarterback at his alma mater of East Tennessee State University in Johnson City, Tenn., Chadwell began his coaching career at ETSU in 2000 when he coached the quarterbacks, and also coached tight ends, running backs and served as recruiting coordinator in 2003. Chadwell earned four letters as a quarterback at ETSU for Coach Paul Hamilton (1997-1999) and Coach Mike Cavan (1995-1996). Following his senior season, he was named a National Football Foundation Hall of Fame Scholar, which was based on athletics, academics and community service.

Chadwell earned a Master's of Business Administration from Charleston Southern in May 2006, and received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Economics and Business from ETSU in May 2000.

CHARLESTON SOUTHERN BOUNCED BY SO. FLORIDA LAST TIME OUT

CSU, playing its third straight game on the road, faced FBS opponent South Florida last Saturday and fell 59-0 Saturday at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa before 38,798 spectators.

With the loss, CSU starts 0-3 for the second year in a row, but will look to right the ship against former Buccaneer assistant Jamey Chadwell and the North Greenville Crusaders as they return home next weekend for their home-opener. Last year the Bucs faced an 0-3 record but won seven of their last nine games to end the year.

"USF is obviously an excellent football team," said Coach [Jay Mills](#). "We expect them to contend for the Big East title and play in a major bowl game. That said, I think a lot of our wounds tonight were self inflicted, but they are correctable. Some of that had to do with playing a really good football team, some of it had to do with crowd noise and a number of things occurred because we didn't execute to the best of our ability. I felt like our effort was good, I liked that 'look in their eyes' so-to-speak. I know we have the coaching staff and the players to correct the things that we need to correct."

CSU had 188 yards of total offense for the game but was shut out for the first time since a 42-0 loss to Liberty on Oct. 25, 2008. [A.J. Toscano](#) finished the game 13-24 with one interception and 127 yards. It is his third-straight game with at least 120 passing yards. [Kwame Krakue](#) looked as if he was on pace to tie his career high six catches for the third time this year after catching three passes for 43 yards in the first half, but was kept without a touch in the final two quarters. [Antwan Ivey](#) led CSU in the rushing and receiving category with six catches for 34 yards, adding 20 yards on eight carries. For the second game this year (Florida), the offensive line did not surrender a sack.

[Fred Godfrey](#) and [Andrew McKain](#) tied for game-high honors with seven tackles each. [James Antaplyan](#) had one tackle-for-loss, while [Ryan Ard](#) and [Jacques Bazile](#) combined for another.

Backup quarterback B.J. Daniels tied starter Matt Grothe with 149 passing yards, and was the leading rusher with 105 yards on eight carries to lead the Bulls in that category. Daniels was 10-13 passing and accounted for three touchdowns (one passing, two rushing).

Special teams' miscues and unforced errors put the Bucs in a hole early as they took on their second FBS school of the season. A fumble on the second play from scrimmage led to an early touchdown by the Bulls, while a 75-yard blocked field goal return went back for the third USF score in the first quarter. A 27-yard pass to Stevenson set up the field goal attempt, and tied the longest pass play of the year for CSU.

A blocked punt on the final drive of the first quarter led to another scoring drive for USF, putting them up 28-0. CSU did record 73 yards of offense in the first quarter alone, but could not find the scoreboard.

POST SEASON '08 FOOTBALL HONORS

Andre Bernardi was a First Team NCAA Division II All-Independent team selection, was a Daktronics All-Super Region 2 first team choice, first team All Independent Collegiate Athletic Association, and to the All-State team in South Carolina alongside the Division I programs. He also was honored by the Orangeburg Touchdown Club as one of the top players in the state.

Rashad Cummings was named to the All-Independent Division II First Team, and defenders **Tyrell Davis** and **Xavier Boykin** were Second Team along with offensive lineman **Zac Durham**. Other players named to the All-ICAA National team were **Xavier Boykin** (First Team), and **Rashad Cummings**, **Zac Durham**, punter **Ronnie Partridge**, and freshman linebacker **Nick Rosamonda**.

LAST YEAR VS. CHARLESTON SOUTHERN:

Time of possession usually isn't a major statistical factor that determines games, but Charleston Southern held onto the ball for over 37 minutes in the game, 13:55 in the first quarter alone, to grind out a 27-0 win over North Greenville at Buccaneer Field.



CSU (1-3) repeatedly drove the ball down the field, but the Crusader defense managed to turn away several drives before the Buccaneers notched a John Paglia field goal with 12:43 left in the second quarter. The Bucs scored three minutes later when Tribble Reese hit Clayton Coffman with a three-yard touchdown pass. CSU added a field goal with four seconds left in the half to give them a 13-0 halftime lead.

The game was largely a defensive battle, but the Division I Buccaneers added two more touchdowns in the third quarter to give them the final margin of victory. Neither team could score in the final quarter.

Charleston Southern largely bottled up the North Greenville offensive attack most of the game. NGU could convert only 120 yards of total offense, and a meager 32 yards on the ground. Rashad Cummings had only 22 yards and Matt Moore had 20. Sophomore quarterback [Richard Harb](#) went 11-24 for 88 yards and one interception. Senior wide receiver Brandon Dobbins had four catches for 38 yards and [Sean Wright](#) had three for 33 yards as two of the bright spots offensively for the Crusaders.

NGU linebackers Tyrell Davis (SR) and [Nick Rosamonda](#) (FR) had busy days with 10 tackles apiece, and [Jereme Green](#) had seven tackles. Andre Bernardi had four total tackles on the day, but he made them count. He had 2.5 tackles for loss and those were also 2.5 sacks.

The Buccaneers won their first game of the year after losses at Miami (FL), Wofford and Miami (OH).

CRUSADER NEWCOMERS SEEING ACTION IN RECENT GAMES

Crusader fans who peruse the box scores of recent games will see a lot of unheralded players starting to pop up. Names like **Taylor Malphrus** (JR Ridge-land, SC) had eight carries at running back, **Josh Murph** (FR Spartanburg, SC) carried 11 yards for a touchdown, **Isaiah Johnson** (FR Fort Lawn, WI) returning a punt return 79 yards for a touchdown (longest this season), **Aaron Seigler** (SO Jacksonville, FL) rushing for 53 yards at quarterback, or **Mark Smith** (FR Greer, SC/Riverside HS) adding four tackles on defense for NGU. Coach Chadwell will find out who can play in the big games.

THIS IS NORTH GREENVILLE

Affiliated with the South Carolina Baptist Convention, NGU is a co-educational liberal arts institution that provides opportunities for higher education in a Christian environment.

The University was born on Oct. 14, 1891 at the 4th annual meeting of the North Greenville Baptist Association. A committee of nine men was appointed to determine where to place a high school in the northern region of Greenville County. Thus, North Greenville High School was opened in 1904. The following year, the Southern Baptist Convention assumed control of the school and North Greenville Baptist Academy was created. In 1934, the charter was amended to create a junior college in addition to the high school. The school was accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and schools in 1957 as a two-year college, eliminating the high school.

In 1991, the college was given candidacy by the Commission, and the first upperclassmen were admitted in 1992.

On September 22, 2005, the Board of Trustees voted to approve university status and changed the school's name to North Greenville University.



“STRIKE THE STONE IS THEME FOR CRUSADERS:

The [Jamey Chadwell](#) era with the North Greenville University football program will began Saturday, August 29, and the first year mentor has categorically laid out the vision for his new team ‘Strike the Stone.’ “What that means is when you are hammering a rock, and you hit it 100 times, it is eventually going to break,” Chadwell said. “It doesn’t break because of the 100th blow, but from the constant pressure you’ve put on it. Our program will be built on the belief that we will maintain pressure on our opponents and they will ultimately break and fall.”

Chadwell, who took over the reins of the NGU program in February, has had but a brief spring practice period to evaluate what remains from a team that endured a murderous schedule that resulted in a deceiving 2-9 record. However, he knows he will have a major challenge re-constructing an offense that returns but four regular starters; But, the young mentor will have a stout veteran defense returning to anchor the first blows on the stone.

Approaching the 2009 season, it would appear NGU would be a mere blip on the schedule for its 10 opponents. Coach Jamey Chadwell thinks otherwise. “I’d like to go undefeated this year; I know it may seem unrealistic, but I know what type of talent we have. Our staff is going to push them to try to win every game. You may look at North Alabama, ranked in the top five in Division II, and say ‘no way,’ you could also look at Charleston Southern, and say, ‘no way,’ ... or, you could look at the three South Atlantic Conference teams we’ll play. It’s a tough schedule, but we’re going in with the attitude that we should have a shot at every game. “
